The Holocaust in American Culture

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Though the Holocaust took place in Europe, it has had a distinctive impact on American culture—in literature, film, television and politics. Likewise, American culture continues to shape what the world thinks and feels about this European catastrophe. In this course, we will read works by authors such as John Hersey, Sylvia Plath, Hannah Arendt, Art Spiegelman, Philip Roth, Isaac Bashevis Singer and Nicole Kraus. Films by Alfred Hitchcock, Fred Zinnemann, Steven Spielberg and Alan Pakula will illuminate questions about cinematic representation and the politics of Hollywood. Special attention will also be devoted to the analysis of video testimonies created in the United States.

Students are expected to:

- a. Come to class on time and prepared
- b. Listen attentively and actively participate in class discussions, without the use of the internet or cellular phones during class. Computer use is highly discouraged.
- c. Send in a discussion question **three times** over the course of the semester. Discussion questions will be sent to my email by 12:00 midnight the night before class.
- d. Submit a 5-7 page take-home exam at the end of the course.
