Course Description:

The course discusses contemporary issues in Arabic and Islamic studies, with a focus on identity and politics. Class discussions comparatively analyze youth culture, youth and politics, the challenges of Muslim minorities in Western countries, and the contemporary Middle East, with special focus on the Arab Spring and women's rights.

Course Goals:

The course aims to encourage in-depth discussion of contemporary Muslim and Arabic identity and politics, as well as to improve the students' academic English skills. At the end of the course, each student should be able to actively participate in a university lecture given in English.

Course Material:

The course material is entirely in English. It is composed of academic articles, newspaper articles, excerpts from fiction literature and video clips.

Course Work:

Attendance and participation in the course are mandatory. Students must prepare a reading assignment for all classes. Further, each student has to submit three written assignments during the semester, which are part of the final grade. **Students who do not submit all three assignments will not be allowed to take the final exam and thus will not complete the course.**

Course Exam:

The final exam consists of multiple-choice questions, open questions, and a few questions relating to English grammar. Only students who **handed in all three written assignments** will be eligible to take the final exam.
